


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VESICA PISCIS


From this shape, we can derive several significant symbols, including:






Its presence resonates in Ireland, Turkey, Greece, China, Israel, Germany, England, Tibet, and Sweden, bearing testament to its universal appeal.


The Tree of Life provides a hierarchical structure for all of the forces in the Universe. It can also be used as a road map of one's soul.

These can be divided into three pillars; the Pillar of Severity, The pillar of Mildness and the Pillar of Mercy.

FRUIT OF LIFE

METATRONS CUBE





GRID OF LIFE


