* * * *	Ayizan	Ayizan(also Grande Ai-Zan, Aizan, or Ayizan Velekete, Aisa, Mama Aisa) is the loa of the marketplace and commerce in Vodou, especially in Benin, Haiti and Suriname.
* * * * * * * * * * * * * * * * * * * *	Baron Samedi	Baron Samedi (English: Baron Saturday), also written Baron Samdi, Bawon Samedi or Bawon Sanmdi, is one of the Iwa of Haitian Vodou.  He is a Iwa of the dead, along with Baron's numerous other incarnations Baron Cimetière, Baron La Croix and Baron Criminel.
***************************************	Maman Brigitte	Maman Brigitte (English: Mother Brigitte) sometimes also written as Manman Brigitte and also known by Gran Brigitte, Grann Brigitte, Manman, Manman Brigit, and Maman Brijit is a death loa (or lwa) and the consort of Baron Samedi in Haitian Vodou.  She drinks rum infused with hot peppers and is symbolized by a black rooster.



***	Damballa	Damballa, also spelled Damballah, Dambala, Dambalah, among other variations (Haitian Creole: Danbala), is one of the most important of all loa, spirits in Haitian Voodoo and other African diaspora religious traditions such as Obeah.
	Papa Legba	Papa Legba is a Iwa in Haitian Vodou, Dominican Vodou, Winti and Louisiana Voodoo, who serves as the intermediary between God and humanity.  He stands at a spiritual crossroads and gives (or denies) permission to speak with the spirits of Guineé, and is believed to speak all human languages.
	Ogun	Ogun or Ogoun is a spirit that appears in several African religions.  He attempted to seize the throne after the demise of Obàtálá, who reigned twice, before and after Oduduwa, but was ousted by Obamakin (Obalufon Ogbogbodirin) and sent on an exile – an event that serves as the core of the Olójó Festival.

S IMMAMOUS S	Agwe	Agwe is commonly depicted as a mullato man dressed in a naval uniform, and when in possession of another behaves as such, saluting and giving orders.  Agwe's female counterpart is La Sirene, the siren of the seas.
* * * * * * * * * * * * * * * * * * *	Damballah- Wedo	Damballah-Wedo is depicted as a serpent or snake, and his veves reflect this aspect of him. When he possesses a human, he does not speak but instead only hisses and whistles.  His movements are also snake-like and can include slithering along the ground, flicking his tongue, and climbing tall objects.
	Gran Bwa	Gran Bwa means "big tree," and he is the master of the forests of Vilokan, the island that is home to the lwa.  He is strongly associated with plants, trees, and practices associated with those materials such as herbalism.
